Happy Holidays to you and your family as a joyous season of celebration begins and we prepare to greet a whole new year of possibilities in 2024! This has been a great year for our chapter, and we have fulfilled our advocacy mission, engaged in multiple ways with the community and enjoyed camaraderie amongst the membership.

Over 40 chapter members came together for the November luncheon to help us close out this monthly event for the year. Lieutenant Colonel (Promotable) Kirsten McFarland, USA, was our luncheon guest and provided a phenomenal presentation on the current and future states of United States Army recruiting. The battalion's mission is "to recruit with integrity the highest quality men and women to meet the needs of an expeditionary Army, while taking exceptional care of Soldiers, Civilians and Families" and their focus is on the active-duty Army and Army Reserve. She broke her presentation down to three main themes: (1) it is hard to get into the Army, (2) young people want to get into the Army and (3) she loves her job. LTC (P) McFarland, USA, discussed new Army physical and medical standards for recruits, the Soldier Referral Program, and the Hometown Recruiter Assistance Program, among other topics. In addition to our speaker's presentation, we were able to participate in a very deserving quilt award to Dr. Tom Seals by Mrs. Pat McMahon of the Quilts of Valor Organization.

It was important to end the year by focusing on recruiting because current and past military leaders make fabulous recruiters of future military members! This year marks the 50th anniversary of the all-volunteer force (AVF). MOAA National has focused on this issue and states, "DoD finds itself in a war for talent: The active duty component faces an environment where personnel shortages result in increased workloads and reduced quality of life amid a recruiting crisis, while the National Guard works to rebound from the stresses of the COVID-19 pandemic and its largest mobilization since World War II." Now is the time to support the AVF by championing the myriad quality of life advocacy initiatives ranging from restoring the Basic Allowance for Housing to 100% to supporting military spouse employment to protecting health care benefits for servicemembers and their families. Legislative Update

Once again, we are waiting for Congress to get it done about a federal budget, and we are living under a second continuing resolution. Is it a gift to us – or a gift to legislators – as there will be no Christmas Eve rush on legislation because it is all pushed into January? I am becoming quite tired of having to write about this matter while other issues await and depend on a resolution.

Listening to our speaker from Army Recruiting, there was an unspoken message in my mind as we passed the 50th Anniversary of the All-Volunteer Force. For those of us who had parents involved in World War II and Korea, as school kids we knew what service our fathers and in some instances our mothers had joined and where they served. Others at the time had parents serving the war effort in other ways. Parental service was part of our culture and our upbringing, and in MOAA we are those people who followed the senior role models into our own times of uniformed service.

But what about now after 50 years of All Volunteer Service? It is good to celebrate the milestone, but so many young adults lack the sense of family heritage that would draw them into uniformed service; thus, the recruiting problems. Some with parents from the anti-war era of the 1960s or from a related counterculture do not even have the slightest idea of national service or value what it means. Then, they raised children who neither know nor value the culture of uniformed service that we in our chapter value so much. 50 years of the all-volunteer service system has not taught them our culture. Just saying...

Now we see the issue reflected in the dwindling number of legislators with service experience. Let us be thankful that the MOAA national office near Washington engages such strong advocacy for matters that concern us. So much of their work is educational for legislators who really do not relate to the armed services. It is not personal for them like it once was. That lack of experienced uniformed service is showing in their approaches to conflicts in Ukraine, Israel, and the South China Sea.

Next year the elections come around, and it might be a good idea to check candidates for their service history so that we can educate them and call them to task.

Enough of that. As we now approach Christmas holiday time, we wish you lots of Joy!
